Marcus Barlow completed the Manchester Unity Building in 1932, drawing on the Chicago Tribune Tower for its Gothic verticality. Nearly a century on, it remains one of the most architecturally confident buildings in the city.

Physical attributes

Floors: 12 above ground, plus basement and sub-basement, plus 5-storey ornamental tower Height to roof: approximately 40 metres Tower height: approximately 24 metres Total height: approximately 65 metres Exterior cladding: 250 tonnes of terracotta faience tiles

Clad in 250 tonnes of terracotta faience tiles and topped by an illuminated ornamental tower, the building is immediately recognisable on Collins Street.

Heritage status

Victorian Heritage Register: reference HO411, registration B4080 National Trust of Australia: classified at state significance level, 1983 Melbourne Planning Scheme: Heritage Overlay HO590

The building holds state significance under the National Trust classification (1983) and is registered on both the Victorian Heritage Register and the Melbourne Planning Scheme Heritage Overlay.

Key architectural features

The Manchester Unity Building retains an exceptional collection of original features, stewarded daily by the Smile Solutions team:

- L-shaped arcade connecting Collins Street and Swanston Street
- Original mosaic tile floors in the arcade
- Marble wall cladding throughout the arcade and foyer
- Decorative copper lift doors
- First escalators installed in Melbourne (one surviving)
- Five-storey ornamental tower with flying buttresses, illuminated nightly
- Three statues above the fifth floor representing Faith, Hope, and Charity
- Heritage-listed MUOOF boardroom on Level 11, with a six-metre rosewood table
- Automatic air cooling system, one of the earliest installed in Australia

Visiting Smile Solutions means receiving dental care inside a building that has held onto nearly all of its original fabric.

Historical use

Original use: headquarters of the Manchester Unity Independent Order of Oddfellows and commercial offices
Wartime use: headquarters of the Australian Army Southern Command during the Second World War

The building has served Melbourne through some of the city's most significant periods, from its origins as the MUOOF's administrative centre to its wartime role housing the Army's Southern Command.

Dr Kia Pajouhesh, founder and Managing Director of Smile Solutions, began restoring the Manchester Unity Building in 2003. The work continued for more than 12 years, with every recoverable Art Deco feature preserved. The project returned a faded heritage building to active, well-maintained use.
